Our family traditions may be too painful for us to continue this year. We may want to change the way we spend Thanksgiving, Christmas, or Hanukkah. Please understand this and maybe some time in the future we will have these traditions again. Whatever our thoughts are for coping with the day, please take our feelings into consideration when you make your plans.

Please allow us to talk about our child, if we feel a need. Perhaps the single most helpful thing you can do for us is to include our child in the holidays. We want to hear his/her name, to have you recall fond memories of their lives, to know that you, too, are feeling their absence and remembering them with love.

As we work through our grief, we will need your patience and support, especially during these holiday times and the “special” days throughout the year.

Thank you for not expecting too much from us this holiday season.

# SUPPORT GROUPS

## **SIDS SUPPORT GROUP**

Our support groups have become a source of support for many of our parents. The SIDS Support Group has grown and developed so that with increasing frequency we have been able to split the group into two. In addition to our regular group facilitator, Pam Borchardt NCBF, we have been blessed with the help of two male facilitator's - Rod Maruyama LCSW and Ken Kuratko NCBF. This group meets on the 2nd Thursday of every month. We hope to be able to offer the men of the group a separate opportunity to meet at least once every 3 months.

## **NEW DIRECTIONS**

We have also added a new group called "New Directions". This group is designed for families who are considering getting pregnant, who are already pregnant or who have new babies. There will be many topics of discussion. We discuss subjects like: How can we enjoy this new baby without being unfaithful to our dead child's memory? How can this new baby get to know his or her dead sibling?

How can I sleep at night? Should I monitor?

Babies are welcome to attend this group with their parents. Too often, we discovered that our grieving parents stop attending the support groups when their subsequent child arrives because they do not want to leave the baby with a sitter. So, this group will welcome the babies and incorporate them into our healing.

The group meets the 1st Tuesday of every month. The first meeting of New Directions was in September. We had 16 parents and babies. There was a surprising amount of laughter mixed with a few tears.

## Did you know?

All soft bedding in a baby's crib is discouraged. That includes bumpers. Bumpers were originally designed when the slats on a crib were so widely spaced that a baby could easily fall out and hurt themselves. Now, the correct spacing for a safe crib is 2 3/8" (or the width of a can of pop). There is no reason to have bumpers in the bed. Baby is safer without them.

# Talking To Children About Death

One of the more difficult things that a parent of a dead child faces is talking with the other children about death. In our society, we prefer to spare children conversations about death. However, it is both helpful and healthy to talk to our children about the death. Here are some suggestions for talking to even very young children:

1. Look into the child's eyes and touch the child gently when discussing a death.
2. Shorten time away from the child. Be sure he knows where you are and how to reach you.
3. Avoid words such as sleeping, resting, loss, passed away, taking a long trip.
4. Talk about what it means to be dead in concrete terms such as someone doesn't breathe, eat, go to the bathroom or grow.
5. Repeat simple, honest explanations as often as the child asks.
6. Reassure the child of his own safety and your plan for continued presence. Share that most people die when they are older.
7. Reassure the child the death was not her fault. Allow them to talk about their feelings. Children often respond to the loss of a loved one with feelings of guilt.
8. Give the child a chance to express his/her grief creatively. Allow expressions of feelings such as drawing pictures, reading and telling stories about death or the loved one, or reenacting the funeral service. Writing, pictures, or clay work can help.
9. Do not avoid discussion of death if the child brings it up.
10. Be willing to share your feelings of grief with the child. Some adults try to hide feelings for the benefit of the child.
11. Be honest in answering any questions the child may have. Keep explanations simple.
12. Allow the child to be silent. The moment may not be right for them to open up.
13. Be patient and loving. Children may express their grief in tantrums, dependency or regression to an earlier age.
14. Be prepared. A child may ask more questions about death as they grow older.
15. Remember that sometimes all a child needs is a touch or a hug.
16. Be a good listener. Correct any confusing ideas the child may have.
17. Provide play opportunities and routine.
18. Provide opportunities to open discussion with a quiet child by reading stories related to death.
19. A child who chooses not to talk about the death may be comfortable writing or drawing her thoughts in a journal.
20. Seek medical assistance if the child becomes depressed, withdrawn for an extended period of time, or makes any type of suicidal statements.

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## — MEDICAL UPDATE —

### *Most Definitive Study of Its Kind Shows That Sleeping on the Stomach Increases Infant SIDS Risk*

*(excerpted from NIH/National Institute of Child and Human Development 10-7-02)*

Researchers have conducted the most definitive study of its kind to show that sleeping on the stomach increases the risk of U.S. infants for Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS). Previously, researchers had relied largely on overseas studies for making the recommendation that infants be placed on the back to sleep in order to reduce their risk for SIDS.

The study focused primarily on SIDS cases among African Americans, a group at roughly twice the risk for SIDS than are Caucasians.

The study results provide strong support for the American Academy of Pediatrics' 1992 and 1996 recommendations that infants be placed to sleep on their backs to reduce the risk of SIDS. The research also underscores the urgency of current programs to ensure that African Americans receive this recommendation.

"This is the largest, most comprehensive study of SIDS risk in an urban, high-risk setting," said Duane Alexander, M.D., Director of the NICHD. "Other studies have linked sleeping on the stomach with Sudden Infant Death Syndrome, but the Chicago Infant Mortality Study makes the strongest case to date."

"Racial and ethnic disparities in infant mortality have been among the most persistent in our society," said James Marks, M.D., Director of CDC's chronic disease program. "This study suggests that at least some of the disparity can be eliminated by wide use of the supine [back] sleeping position among African-American infants."

The study was conducted in Chicago because that city has a large African American community. The researchers compared infor-

mation about each infant to information about a control infant—a living infant of comparable age, who was from the same racial and or ethnic group, and who had a similar birth weight. All of the SIDS deaths were evaluated by the Cook County medical examiner's office; autopsies had been conducted to rule out other causes of death. Death scene investigators conducted interviews about circumstances surrounding the deaths. Roughly two weeks after the death, another interview was conducted with the infant's primary caregiver. This interview included questions not included on the death scene investigation, such as the infant's routine sleep patterns and access to health care. The current study found that African Americans at that time were less likely than Caucasians to have been informed by health care personnel to avoid placing infants to sleep on the stomach. Most of the SIDS deaths occurred within the first four months of life, with most of these occurring between the first month and the third month. Consistent with other studies, most of the SIDS infants had died in the fall or winter—64 percent.

The percentage of stomach sleeping for the infant's last sleep was similar in all of the SIDS infants—58 percent among African Americans, and 55 percent for all other ethnic groups. Among the control group, 43 percent of African Americans were usually placed to sleep on their stomachs, compared to 12 percent for the other groups. Infants placed to sleep on their stomachs were at more than twice the risk for SIDS as were infants sleeping in other positions.
